The cross is just plain hard.

As is the good news of Jesus, which tells us that suffering is real and that joy comes in the morning.

That the humiliation and pain of the cross . . .
is always redeemed by love.

- from *Jesus Freak*, by Sara Miles

I believe that quote as much as I believe anything. In fact if I had to come up with a sentence or two to summarize how I believe life and faith work, it would be similar to what Sara Miles wrote above.

Suffering is ever present in our world, in our community, in our lives. Suffering is an undeniable part of our day-to-day reality. This Lent we have grieved with the people of Japan, Libya, and Bahrain and closer to home, we have grieved with the Young Tait family at the loss of a beloved. We know that hurts of all shapes and sizes exist, and part of allowing our faith to mature is to make room in our hearts and lives to receive it.

But suffering is not all there is, and even in the midst of suffering, there is often more than suffering present. Faith tells us that where there is suffering, there is God. And where there is God there is love, and the cross, while shattering previous notions of “the divine” also mysteriously pulls all these pieces together. God is present on the cross, not to glorify suffering, but to redeem it, to show us that even in the darkest places, light is still, miraculously, doing its work.

Which is what Holy Week is all about. It begins with a proclamation of “Hosanna!” on Palm Sunday and continues on Maundy Thursday with the most intimate rituals we know, the washing of feet and the sharing of food. The seeds of love are planted among us through Jesus’ commands to “love one another” and to “do this in remembrance of me.” And on Good Friday we hear of God’s Son present with us on the cross, which in Miles words is, “just plain hard,” but is also an action of extreme and loving solidarity with us. The suffering is real, but love is there too.

And then as we watch and wait through the darkness, joy comes to us in the morning. A fire is lit. The light is passed. Our “Alleluia” returns and we who have acknowledged the reality of suffering are invited to know the promise and presence of joy. The seeds of love planted along the way blossom beyond our greatest imaginings as resurrection comes among us and life begins anew.

Join us for “the hard of the cross,” the love that is planted, and the Alleluias that break forth again as we celebrate Holy Week and Easter at Grace Church.

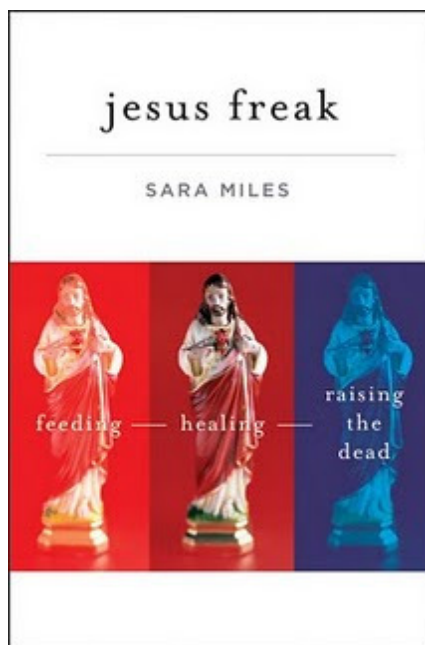

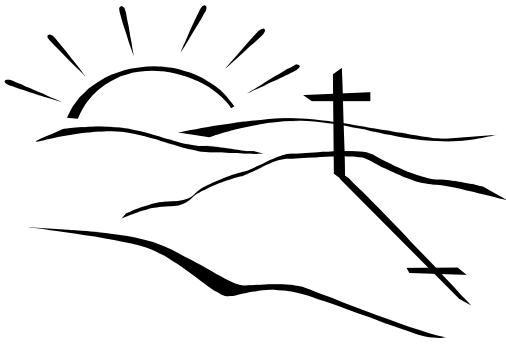

We Process and Shout Hosanna! - Palm Sunday (April 17) 8:15, 10:30AM

Join us for a blessing of the palms, triumphal procession into church, narration of the Passion of Our Lord, and celebration of Holy Communion. The 10:30 service will begin in the Church yard—weather permitting.

We ‘Do this in Remembrance’ - Maundy Thursday (April 21) 6PM

Join us for an Agape meal, a foot washing, and Communion as we remember the Last Supper. We close with a stripping of the altar in preparation for Good Friday. An all-night prayer vigil continues in the chapel. Please bring bread or wine or fruit for the meal if you are able.

We Kneel at the Foot of the Cross - Good Friday (April 22) 7PM

Join us as we mark the crucifixion of our Lord with the Story of the Passion, solemn reflections, prayers, and song.

We Proclaim His Resurrection! - Easter Sunday (April 24) 6:00 & 10AM

Easter Vigil (6:00AM) - Gather with us before sunrise in the Church yard as we kindle a fire in the darkness and process in to listen to the Biblical story of God’s saving actions. The Diocese of Western Michigan - update on Mission Trips for 2011.

July 1 – 9 to Pine Ridge, South Dakota, Oglala Lakota Nation. Cost - \$375.00. Four openings remaining. Housing restoration and improving living standards on the reservation are paramount. Besides your work experience, you will be immersed in the culture of the reservation and interact with the native people.

September 24 – October 1 to Barnes Mt, Kentucky. Cost - \$200.00. Twelve openings remain. In the heart of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Appalachia, volunteers may find themselves building a deck, painting, adding a room to a home or trailer, replacing a floor, clearing land, landscaping, or preparing meals for fellow volunteers. On Tuesday evening, volunteers will share a meal with the local people they work with during the day. Evenings may also be spent learning about Appalachian culture from area residents.

November 11 – 20 New Orleans, LA. Cost - \$10.00 per day. Ten openings remain. The Episcopal Diocese of Louisiana continues to help families return to New Orleans six years after Katrina. The Diocese now concentrates on home repairs. Recently, a displaced family still living in Little Rock, Arkansas was returned home after volunteers from our Diocese restored their property. A similar project is planned for this year.

Feeding America

Mark your calendars for our upcoming Feeding America dates: April 14th and May 12th. We need folks to arrive between 4:30 and 5:00 to help with set-up and to welcome our guests.

Also, remember the ongoing need for *laundry detergent and toilet paper*! You can bring these items at any time and deposit them in the labeled drawers in the Commons. With a little corporate help we have managed to distribute these items to each family for the past four months. Good job Grace!

Update: No more used plastic bags! Thank you so much to all of you who have been saving your bags for use during our food distribution. Due to Feeding America regulations, we will *no longer be able to pack food in used plastic bags*.

Exciting Announcement: Meijer stores have partnered with Grace Episcopal Church for their Spring *Simply Give Food Pantry Campaign* running from March 20 to May 14, 2011.

Food Pantry Donation cards can be picked up at Grace or from kiosks at Meijer. Upon presentation at the store's check out, these cards will be scanned and you will be charged \$10 and \$10 is then credited to Grace Church's Feeding America outreach program. At the conclusion of this campaign Meijer will make a matching donation to our Feeding America outreach program. Participating stores for Grace are the 16th Street and the West Shore Drive Holland locations only.

These Donation Cards can also be given to family members, friends and any churches/religious partners to help drive donations. Donation Cards are also available to the public at kiosks in the stores.

At the conclusion of this campaign Meijer will make an additional matching donation to Grace Church's Feeding America outreach program which effectively results in a \$10 Donation Card becoming \$20.

From Stewardship Commission:

Thank you for your donations to Grace Church. Through your generosity, we are able to continue our programming and ministry in a cost effective manner.

Our budget is based on the flow of funds as previously received. Most months we should end in a positive fashion but a few months are projected to end in a deficit. To help remedy this situation, we instituted Electronic Fund Transfers as a way to balance our cash flow. This has helped tremendously! Additionally, we set our budget at a level to slightly increase our activities. This required the Stewardship Committee to ask for an additional appeal to meet these figures. You responded in a positive way!

In averaging out our income, taking into account the EFT donations, we need \$4,161.06 in the weekly collection to fulfill our obligations. These weekly figures are listed in the bulletin. The monthly figures listed in the bulletin are based on actual budgeted amounts and are not averaged.

The Ducks are back.

From the Taking Grace Green Committee of the Stewardship Commission

In the Spring, six years ago, a pair of Mallard Ducks came into our front yard and began eating the fallen songbird seed beneath our feeder. We were surprised to see them. Then they returned again and again. We thought they might have a nest nearby and that this might just be a feeding stop on their circuit in the neighborhood. They continued coming in the morning and evening as the season progressed.

As we watched them with interest and amusement we were a little concerned for their safety with the curious children and dogs in the area. The base of the feeder was screened from the street by some landscaping and people had now noticed their flights in and out and began to look for them as they walked by. And the ducks had started to settle in on the grass for a nap after a meal. We told the neighbors on each side of us and across the street, and we took special care not to let our dogs out in front when they were there.

Finally we realized that they soon would have a cache of eggs in their nest, We kept the seed supply recharged so they would have enough. The female began coming more often and seemed to be building up strength for the event. Then she was gone for a while and the male came by himself.

Within a few days the two took turns feeding quickly and then flying off to the Northwest corner of our lawn, toward the creek that ran behind the homes at the West end of our street.

When the ducks were there people stopped and stood watching at a respectful distance. Children carefully watched just far enough away so the pair wasn't disturbed. It seemed that the people in the a neighborhood had adopted them as being part of the things happening on our block.

They came and went all Summer. We never did see they young. Then, with the approach of Fall, they were gone. We smiled and felt we had witnessed something special and the seasons went on.

As Spring approached the following year they returned. We went through the same series of events, starting slow then picking up with more visits. People noticed they were back and the fun began again. Nobody, dogs included, bothered them and the pattern played out. Fall came and one day they were gone.

The following Spring they were back. This time a different drake came with the female. In a few weeks the first drake arrived and chased the new guy off, and life began again. Some courting and mating happened right outside our front window. Then they played out the story and left in the Fall.

The cycle has been happening for at least six years now. And yesterday, March 10, they showed up early for the new season. The ducks are back . . . and so is Spring.

Our April challenge to the people of Grace is to get outside and see all the wonderful things starting to happen. Hang some clothes out to dry and save energy. Open up your windows and freshen up your house. And enjoy the arrival of Spring.
