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"We give thanks for the Resurrection..." Easter Season Message 2011

The Resurrection must be understood in significantly different images and metaphors in the southern hemisphere, when Easter always arrives in the transition from summer to winter. Even as a hard, hard winter lingers on in northern climes, with unaccustomed April snow in many places, we yearn for the new life we know is waiting around the corner. As Christians, we're meant to have the same hunger for the new creation emerging all around us.

We can see the broken places of our world either as complete and utter disaster, or as seedbeds, or graves, even that in which God is doing a new thing. The situation in Haiti is dire, yet day by day and person by person hope lightens and leavens. Plans are emerging for civic reconstruction in Port-au-Prince that would bless the nation with pride in its heritage and more effective government. The Episcopal Church is a partner in those possibilities, as the vision for a rebuilt cathedral takes form. The graves are becoming gardens, at Cathdrale Sainte-Trinity and College St. Pierre. New and more life-giving relationships are emerging between development ministries and the lives of the people. Resurrection is happening in many places, even if one must search for it, like looking for the first buds on the trees as ice and snow give way to the warmth of spring.

The aftermath of earthquake and tsunami in Japan continues to look a great deal like winter, and the trials and failures at Daiichi Fukushima currently resonate more with apocalypse than Easter. Yet across northeastern Japan the work of the faithful is feeding senior citizens, ministering to displaced persons in shelters, and prompting challenging questions about social priorities, energy use, and consumerist lifestyles.

The gift of Easter insists that human beings are capable of divine relationship, for as Athanasius put it, "God became human that human beings might become divine." The life, death, passion, and resurrection of Jesus are the cosmic insistence that nothing can separate us from the divine passion for humanity. Easter people are imprinted with the assurance that God is always working some new grace of creation out of death and destruction.

For most of us the dying is not cosmic. It may start with a small willingness to set aside self, or a new opportunity for grafting onto a greater whole. Or it may involve lowering the barriers between self and other to become more readily aware of our fundamental oneness, our common heritage as offspring of the Holy One. If we are to be followers of Jesus, we share the work he did on our behalf. We give thanks for the Resurrection, and we become part of Jesus' ongoing work, as we become aware of its power in our own lives.

May your Eastertide be filled with the grace of new life.
Go, discover, and BE resurrection for the world around you.

The Diocese of Western Michigan - update on Mission Trips for 2011.

July 1 – 9 to Pine Ridge, South Dakota, Oglala Lakota Nation. Cost - \$375.00. Four openings remaining. Housing restoration and improving living standards on the reservation are paramount. Besides your work experience, you will be immersed in the culture of the reservation and interact with the native people.

September 24 – October 1 to Barnes Mt, Kentucky. Cost - \$200.00. Twelve openings remain. In the heart of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Appalachia, volunteers may find themselves building a deck, painting, adding a room to a home or trailer, replacing a floor, clearing land, landscaping, or preparing meals for fellow volunteers. On Tuesday evening, volunteers will share a meal with the local people they work with during the day. Evenings may also be spent learning about Appalachian culture from area residents.

November 11 – 20 New Orleans, LA. Cost - \$10.00 per day. Ten openings remain. The Episcopal Diocese of Louisiana continues to help families return to New Orleans six years after Katrina. The Diocese now concentrates on home repairs. Recently, a displaced family still living in Little Rock, Arkansas was returned home after volunteers from our Diocese restored their property. A similar project is planned for this year.

SPIRITUAL JOURNEYS III

I always knew prayer was important, but I often had difficulty praying. It seemed like all I had was a laundry list of requests. Sometimes I prayed in thanksgiving, but I never really prayed for my “enemies”... those with whom I did not get along or those who tried to do things against me. I never really paid attention to those around me when it came to prayer.

At church camp, as a teenager, I learned how to have a personal relationship with God. That relationship was strengthened when I attended my Cursillo weekend. I felt the strong presence of God and wanted more from the relationship I had begun as a teenager.

God has made changes in me to make me more aware of those around me who need prayer. He has shown me that praying for my enemies can make a difference. Someone at work was making my life very difficult. I was worried about what would happen to my job if things continued in the direction they were going at the time. My stomach hurt every time I had to see the person. I began praying specifically for that person. I prayed that the person would see God in me and that the person’s own issues would be revealed to the person. Slowly things began to change. My stomach did not hurt every time I saw the person. Over the course of three years I could have more contact and civil conversation with the person. Within the last few months I have heard an apology from the person for the person’s behavior. I was very surprised and glad to hear the apology, and positive changes continue to occur.

In addition to praying for my enemies, God has shown me the power of healing prayer and has called me to a ministry of healing. I have to say I am not always a willing recipient of God’s gifts, but I also know that God would not give them to me if He didn’t think I could handle them.

I know God is always with me, and He is only a prayer away.

Where did the "Moor Money" come from? (i.e. How can we afford these building improvements?)

Harold Moor owned and operated a shoe store in downtown Holland prior to his death in 1978. He and Ruth were long time members of Grace and upon her passing in 1998, having no children, they passed the bulk of their estate to Grace in the amount of \$288,000 which was received in October of 2002. The bequest specified the money was not to be endowed but to be spent for non-budgetary items, special projects, enhancements to the organ, and it further specified the money was not to be used to reduce debt.

Because the parish did not have a financial cushion at the time and for some time to come, the money remained largely un-touched. As the church became more financially sound and projects needed attention, the Moor money was used to repair the stained glass windows, to repair the houses for entry into the Community Housing Partnership, and to refurbish the Commons, bathrooms and Adult Forum room. There remains about \$150,000, some of which is being considered for enhancements to the organ, and the remaining to be used to refurbish the undercroft and upgrade the adjoining kitchen.

I doubt the Moor's had any idea how much of an impact their bequest has had on the life of Grace or how long their legacy will be enjoyed by so many. We are grateful for the Moor's thoughtful remembrance of Grace in their estate planning.

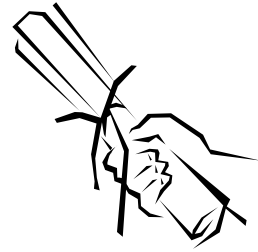
