and one was a doctor and one was a queen, and one was a shepherdess

Recently published, *Holy Women, Holy Men: Celebrating the Saints*, the new book of commemorations on the Episcopal Church calendar, includes doctors and queens, as well as deacons, nuns, priests, bishops, writers, kings, apostles, missionaries, hymn-makers, soldiers, monks, artists, composers, mystics, jurists, liberators, prophets and even an Olympic champion (and missionary to China)!

About 10 years ago, Frank T. Griswold, then-presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church, asked the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music “to undertake a review and revision of *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*.” *Holy Women, Holy Men* is the result of that request and is the first complete revision of the text devoted to Episcopal Church saints in more than 40 years.

“More than 100 new commemorations were approved at the 2009 General Convention... Nine years in the making, the new volume offers a fuller representation of the diversity of the Episcopal Church as well as a broader ecumenical and international mix of commemorations,” says the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music. While a significant number of these saints are from the most recent centuries, the additions include saints from every period of church history. It’s an amazing, diverse collection of holy people.

The 2009 General Convention called for trial use of these commemorations, giving opportunity to pray with this new material before a final decision about whether to add each commemoration to the calendar of *The Book of Common Prayer*. They invited us all to pray through this new calendar and share our feedback of the experience.

Ruth Meyers, professor of liturgics at Church Divinity School of the Pacific and chair of SCLM (and formerly a Rector in the Diocese of Western Michigan!) says, “It’s important that everyone have an opportunity to review and provide input on this major work. That includes individuals as well as congregations and dioceses.” This is a uniquely Episcopalian invitation to give our individual input to the larger consideration of the holy women and men of the faith.

So, as we celebrate the Saints and welcome newcomers here at Grace on Sunday, November 7th know that we’ve also been invited into an extended experience of prayer and thoughtfulness offered throughout the Church. Visit <http://liturgyandmusic.wordpress.com/> to jump in.

You do not have to attend every class, come when you can. Bring a sack lunch if you wish. Hope to see you there.

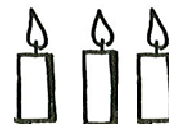

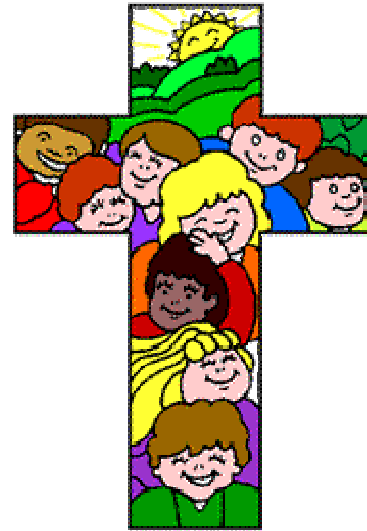

It has been great to see so many of our children and youth involved in Sunday morning Education Hour (meets 9:15-10:15 in the Undercroft). The combined Elementary classroom has provided the ability to have a wide range of class activities, and we are all loving the new curriculum. Middle School units for this fall are "Community Leaders" and "Christians Build Community". They will continue to utilize the Episcopal Youth Curriculum and the Nooma video series. High School has begun the second year of the Confirm not Conform program, which continues to challenge them to look inward at their faith.

Advent begins on Sunday, November 28th, and with it comes our "Advent Intergenerational Lesson". You really won't want to miss this one. Remember, this is geared for children and youth of ALL AGES and it is the multi-generational aspect of it which benefits the lesson. Don't miss it!

Feeding America (Or at least our little corner of it!)

In January Grace joined a growing number of groups who provide food to our neighbors through the Feeding America food distribution program. Since that beginning we have served 855 families totaling 1880 people.

In addition to food, we continue to collect toilet paper and detergent to distribute to our guests each month. For each distribution we need at least 100 regular size detergents and 100 four-roll packs of toilet paper. Consider what you might add to your own shopping cart to donate each month. If that is not possible, donations for purchasing tissue and soap can be made to Grace with "FA" in the memo line.

Please set aside the **second Thursday of every month** (November 11, December 9...) and be here to offer hospitality, coffee and cookies and to help unload the truck filled with 5000 pounds of food. There is a place for everyone in this work, so plan to show up as soon after 4:30 as possible.

There is plenty of food to go around. Be a part of the team and help us get that abundance into the hands that hunger for more.

Community Kitchen Helpers Needed:

Every weekday and on Sundays too, the Community Kitchen serves lunch to about 200 hungry people out of the commons area at Western Seminary. Grace Church is committed to providing **two helpers each Wednesday**, and occasionally an extra person is needed, often at the last minute if someone calls in sick. **Volunteers** are needed to help serve and clean up from **11:15am to 1:30pm** every Wednesday. Please sign up in the Commons and let us know if you are available to be "on-call".

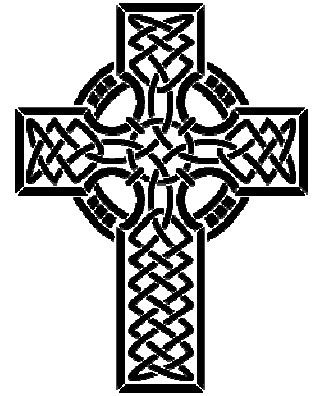


From Stewardship:

Dear Member or Friend of Grace Church,

This year at Grace Episcopal Church we:

- Helped feed hundreds of families through our work with Feeding America and our weekly presence at Community Kitchen.
- Re-launched our Sunday morning “Growing Into Worship” program and set new a record of eighteen four to six year olds.
- Completed the training of two soon-to-be-commissioned Stephens Ministers, adding to our team of pastoral care companions.
- Prepared to welcome about twenty new individuals and families on All Saints Sunday.
- Re-paved the parking lot, repaired portions of the church roof, seeded the side yard and refreshed the two Grace houses in order to welcome two new Community Housing Partnership families into them.
- Began a new instrumental program to compliment our Chamber and Youth Choirs, further celebrating and integrating the musical gifts of our parishioners.
- Explored theology from the viewpoints of the poor and marginalized welcoming participants from the community and speakers from Western Theological Seminary and Hope College.
- Increased our diocesan pledge and committed to grow into our canonically mandated full apportionment by the year 2012.
- Celebrated a renewal of the Commons and upstairs restrooms (*not* out of budgeted funds but thanks to the bequests of several former members.)



So, in our pledge appeal we combine the celebration of these wonderful things that are happening with the challenge that comes with such growth. We must grow our budget, as we grow our parish, as we grow in our understanding of what it means to be Grace Church. Our theme for this year’s drive is “Grace, Gratitude, Generosity.” In this congregation there is so much for which to be grateful and an amazingly consistent spirit of generosity that makes it all possible.

As we move forward, financial pledging is an integral, critical part of our future. It allows us to plan communally and to be disciplined in our giving individually. Episcopalians recognize the challenge of the tithe and hold that as a standard of giving towards which we are called to strive.

The goals we’ve set for this year are to increase total giving by \$20,000, to add twenty new pledging “units,” to increase EFT (electronic fund transfer) givers by ten, and to achieve the total pledged goal of \$320,000. We’ve set these goals knowing they will stretch us but also believing that they are fully within our reach as a growing Grace.

We ask that you mail your pledge cards back to Grace or bring them to Church on Ingathering Sunday, November 14th. As you pledge, know that every gift matters. Every pledge contributes to our mission of caring for one another, the community and God’s world. For every pledge, we are truly and deeply grateful.

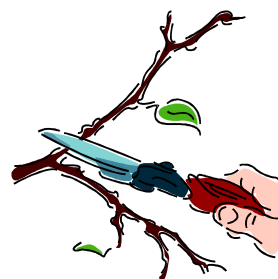

To Do Good, You Have to Actually Do Something

Yvon Choinard, founder of the Patagonia clothing company is a world class rock and ice climber, fly fisherman, surfer, kayaker, and world class environmentalist who leads by example. He is currently in an advertising campaign for American Express Partnership featuring well known "action" people. The Choinard commercial focuses on our being a part of nature and actually doing something.

While the camera shows him climbing a rock formation, he says, "We're part of nature and when we destroy nature we destroy ourselves. It's a selfish thing to want to protect nature. I never intended to be a businessman . . . (but when I became one) we made the best climbing equipment out of here (the Shed)."

While the camera shows climbing tools, he says, "We realized that the putting in and taking out of all these pitons was causing damage to the rocks (we climb). So I made these little aluminum chocks that you put in (the cracks) with your fingers."

While standing in front of an old dam, he says, "And, I'm a dam buster. We've been working for years to take this dam out. The reservoir behind it is only four feet deep . . . so the water gets real warm and kills a lot of the life on the river. When you take out a dam it's a real victory . . . a concrete victory so to speak."

While the camera shows him ice climbing, he says, "I get an idea to do something . . . and then I like to take the first step. If that feels good, I take another step, and then another. **To do good you have to actually do something.**"

In an interview with Tom Brokaw Choinard said, "Everyone can do something good for the environment. If you are a good speaker you can talk about things going on in the environment with others. If you are a good writer you can write about things going on and get your stories published so people can read them. If you are well organized you can organize people to actually do something for the environment."

"At Patagonia we try to do things that make sense. We got into using organic cotton because the when the ventilation in one of our stores was bad our people got sick from breathing the formaldehyde used on the cotton we had been selling."

"We began using less packaging on our Capilene underwear because we saw all the waste our current packaging had created."

"We began using recycled fleece and polyester because we found out the technology was available and it was the right thing to do."

"Each time we did the right thing, even though risky, we saw our sales go up, because we were doing the right thing."

Each of us can do the right things every day. We can give back to the special places that move us, humble us, nourish us . . . by talking about them, taking people to see them, keeping them clean, protecting them, and leading by example.

Each of us can do good by actually doing something.
