From the Rector

*Living God, eternal Holy Spirit, let your bright intoxicating energy
which fired those first disciples fall on us to turn the world again.*

— The New Zealand (Anglican) Prayer Book

May 23rd is the Day of Pentecost this year which marks the fiftieth day of the Easter Season. This is the day on which we celebrate the coming of the Spirit upon the disciples, fondly known as “The Birthday of the Church.” The Book of Acts says that the Spirit came like this: “Suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.” Each disciple spoke to a different people, proclaiming the good news in lots of directions all at one time. So that first Pentecost wasn’t orderly or at all predictable; it was chaotic and filled with the “intoxicating energy” of the prayer above. The Church at its birth was immediately filled with life and the disciples were gifted with ministries that stretched them out into a diverse and hungry world.

On the 22nd (the day before Pentecost,) four members of Grace will be either confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church at a diocesan service at Grace, Grand Rapids. And on Pentecost here at Grace, as we celebrate ministries and new births, we will honor their renewed commitment to Christ and the ministries to which God is calling them. We will also thank Sunday School teachers, youth leaders, choir members, children, youth and acolytes acknowledging those who contribute weekly to making our worship prayerful and lively, and keeping our programs spirit-filled. We will thank those whose ministries include speaking the tongues that are Grace, those who proclaim the good news to our various ministry groups and within our many worship services in ways that our ears can hear and our hearts can receive.

Come join in the energy, the Spirit that is alive and well and will be celebrated on Pentecost at Grace Church. Help us say ‘thank you’ and to bless the Spirit as is blows through the lives of the people. The world is still diverse and in need of many tongues to proclaim in ways that can be heard and celebrated. The world is still hungry, in need of being fed by the good news of Christ.

Water, Wind, Earth & Fire: The Christian Practice of Praying with the Elements

Join us for six Wednesday evening's this summer as we explore praying with the elements. Christian tradition tells us that we have received two books of divine revelation: the book of scripture and the book of nature. Creation itself is a sacred text through which the presence of God is revealed to us. There is much to explore in the water, wind, earth and fire and the summertime seems like a wonderful time to explore how we can pray with the elements of creation!

The book is organized around "The Canticle of Creation" by St. Francis of Assisi, "Water, Wind, Earth, and Fire" is the first book to consider the ways in which praying with the natural elements can enliven Christian spiritual life.

Paintner offers concrete suggestions and guided contemplative exercises; for instance, she suggests that readers take time to "watch the sunrise or sunset and breathe in the beauty of the fiery sky. Contemplate what those beginnings and endings have to say in your own life." Readers benefit from the author's extensive training in theology and Benedictine spirituality, as well as her unique work in bringing the expressive arts to spiritual direction.

Classes will meet on Monday evening's beginning June 28, 2010 and continue through August 2, 2010 and we will meet from 7:00 pm – 8:30 pm. Mary Benedict and Mary Huisman will facilitate the class. A Sign up sheet will be available later in May!

Hitchcock the Focus of Movie Series



The films of Alfred Hitchcock literally cry out for psychological and spiritual interpretation. In June I will be offering the first of a “movable feast,” an examination of some of his classic films. In June there will be three:

Wednesday June 2: VERTIGO, 1958, starring James Stewart and Kim Novak. Considered by many critics to be Hitchcock’s greatest achievement, this film explores personal obsessions. Set among San Francisco’s renown landmarks, Stewart is brilliant as Scottie Ferguson, an acrophobic detective hired to shadow a friend’s suicidal wife, Madeline (Kim Novak). Then events turn dark, and we enter into the dark night of the soul.

Wednesday, June 9: SHADOW OF A DOUBT, 1942, starring Joseph Cotton and Teresa Wright. This was Hitchcock’s favorite among all his films. Joseph Cotton stars as Uncle Charlie, a calculating and charming killer who hides out in his relatives’ small hometown. There he befriends his favorite niece and namesake, Young Charlie (Teresa Wright). But she begins to suspect he may be the famed Merry Widow murderer. A deadly game of cat and mouse ensues as the psychopathic killer plots the death of his young niece to protect his secret.

Wednesday, June 16: LIFEBOAT, 1944, written by John Steinbeck and starring Tallulah Bankhead and William Bendix, among others. Nominated for three Academy Awards, this gripping World War II drama is a remarkable story of human survival. After their ship is sunk in the Atlantic by Germans, eight people are stranded in a lifeboat. Their problems are further compounded when they pick up a ninth passenger—the Nazi captain from the U-boat that torpedoed them. With powerful suspense and emotion, this legendary classic reveals the strengths and frailties of individuals under extraordinary duress.

Winter Pansies - by Bill Mendenhall (Taking Grace Green Committee)

Every year, late in the fall, as Winter approaches, the flowers in the yard start to wither and die as the night brings the frost. The flowers by our patio succumb, one variety at a time. But this past Winter something different happened. The yellow and blue Pansies at the edge of the patio by the birdbath took a stand.

When the first frosts came they closed. And, as the sun came out the next day, they opened. When the first snows came and they were covered . . . then they peaked out in full color as the snow melted in the morning. As the snows grew heavier, they persisted. When it was time to shovel the patio, so our dog could go out to the grassy part of the yard, I was careful to use the shovel lightly around the bits of color peaking through the edge of the snow. The Pansies responded and fought their way back into the sunlight . . . holding their bright color. They seemed determined to last as long as possible and I felt that I could help . . . and enjoy the color. As the bigger storms came in they were covered for longer periods. And, each time I thought they were gone, they surprised me by peaking out again. After a while I supposed they were frozen and simply holding their bright yellow and blue color. Then, when the sun warmed the patio, I could see that they were still alive.

This went on through the Christmas holidays, then the mid-winter months, and into March. And they kept coming back. In mid-March we had a long warm spell that seemed like Spring and Summer. We went away to Colorado and when we came back there they were, three or four blooms still surviving. They looked a bit dry, so I started watering them. They responded again . . . kind of stretching and gaining energy. Now, in early April, the stems and green leaves have begun to fill out, and the yellow and blue blooms are coming out all along the edge of the patio . . . putting on a show of color. My wife, Jill, says they are probably "winter hardy" Pansies. And they may be. But somehow I think they are something more. I think they are Winter Pansies that decided to stay alive. And they succeeded. They made us happy. We are thankful they persisted.

Special things happen all around us. If we open our senses to notice, we will be treated, again and again, to the joys beyond ourselves.

Just one more thing....

At a recent gathering of John and Kim Shea's "Holy Chow" group, a desert was presented which apparently deserves special notice...

Emeril's Flourless Chocolate Cake - Modified by Jay (Bylsma!)

INGREDIENTS:

1 pound semisweet chocolate, finely chopped	1/3 cup Kahlua
1/2 pound (2 sticks) unsalted butter, cut into 1/4 inch cubes, plus 1/4 tablespoon	8 large eggs
1/4 cup sugar	1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt	Confectioners' sugar or cocoa powder for decoration

Preheat oven to 325°F. Using 1/4 tablespoon butter, grease a 9-inch springform pan – sides and bottom and line bottom with a parchment round. Wrap the springform pan outside and bottom with heavy duty aluminum foil. Place pan in a roasting pan. Bring a medium saucepan of water to boil. Either - combine the chocolate, butter, and Kahlua in a metal bowl set over simmering water or in the top of a double boiler. Melt the mixture, stirring constantly, until smooth and creamy, about 5 minutes; reserve, or, - slowly feed chocolate pieces into a food processor, process until fine. Microwave butter until just melted, add the Kahlua and pour the mixture slowly into the chocolate with the food processor running. Transfer the chocolate mixture to a large mixing bowl.

Meanwhile combine eggs, sugar, vanilla, and salt in a large bowl and beat with an electric mixer until frothy and almost doubled in volume, about 5 minutes. Fold one-third of egg mixture into chocolate mixture using a rubber spatula. Repeat this process two more times, until all of egg mixture has been completely folded into chocolate mixture. Pour batter into prepared springform pan and pour enough boiling water into the roasting pan to come about halfway up the sides of the springform pan. Bake until cake has risen slightly and edges are just beginning to set, about 25 minutes. Remove cake from roasting pan and cool on wire rack to room temperature. Remove foil, cover, and refrigerate overnight.

Remove cake from refrigerator about 30 minutes before serving. Remove springform pan sides, invert cake onto a large plate, and peel away parchment paper from bottom. Reinvert cake on another large plate or serving platter and garnish with confectioners' sugar or cocoa powder immediately before serving. Makes one 9-inch cake, about 16 servings

Jay's Tips:

Use two layers of aluminum foil to wrap the springform pan so as form a watertight seal as the smallest pinhole in the foil will allow water to seep into the cake to its detriment. Run a sharp knife around the inside edge of the spring form pan before releasing the sides, this will prevent the cake from sticking to the sides when the outer ring of the pan is released. When the cake is inverted the first time, it may not fall away from the bottom of the spring form pan. If you initially assemble the spring form pan with the bottom upside down, that is the lip of the bottom is down, it will be easier to slide a knife between the bottom of the pan and the parchment paper to get the cake to release from the bottom of the springform pan.
