The Realignment that is Lent

This year I've decided that one of the best metaphors for what we are about this season might actually be the work of a chiropractor. Chiropractors help the body re-align and the treatment is generally offered for reasons of pain, or basic functioning issues, or core health needs. And in Lent, our work sounds a lot like that. This season we are called to pay particular attention to the ways in which we are out of alignment spiritually and to do what it takes to get back in faithful sync. We are called also to tend to the larger Body of Christ, offering ourselves to its hurting places, renewing our commitment to its health, and moving steadily forward together into the Paschal mystery, that which ultimately aligns us with the grace filled promise of new life.

And so this season, we listen to our bones and ask what it will take them to dance. We notice our imbalances and do what it takes to reground ourselves. We tend to our own pain and the suffering of the world and do something to help alleviate that which can be relieved. And we consider the Body, asking what reconciliation among God's people really involves and then do a little something (or a big something) that might help a lost one, or a disenfranchised one, or a stray one to re-home among us.

So consider doing some realigning over the course of these forty days. Our bodies, our souls and the larger Body of Christ need a season like this to name what's not quite right and to take intentional steps toward righting it, whatever that means in terms of faithful response to self, and God, and neighbor. And then ultimately, through the grace of God, we will be healed, we will be whole, and new life will come with the Alleluias we have yet to sing.



After her conversion from Orthodox Judaism to Christianity, Lauren Winner found that her life was indelibly marked by the rich traditions and spiritual practices of Judaism and so she set out to discover how she could incorporate some of these practices into her new faith. The ancient disciples form us to respond to God, over and over always, in gratitude, in obedience, and in faith." TUSCALOOSA, ALABAMA, FIRST 2012 DIOCESAN MISSION

When the tornadoes hit in April 2011, 228 residents of Alabama died. Hundreds of buildings and homes were leveled. Rescuers used pieces of debris as makeshift stretchers for survivors. Homes were without roofs. Household items were scattered all over the city. Streets were impassible, the pavement strewn with trees, houses and cars with their windows blown out. Like New Orleans, it will take years to recover from the devastation.

March 9 to March 18 are the dates for the mission to Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Helping rebuild the area is the primary focus. Work besides rebuilding will also be available. Experience with dry wall, framing, flooring, installing windows, doors, cabinets and bathroom fixtures is a plus. Painting, insulating, yard work, clean up, camp maintenance, and meal preparation are also needed. Crew leaders provide on the job training for volunteers.

Stewardship—Taking Grace Green

Reduce, Repair, Reuse, Recycle, Reimagine a World Where We Take Only What Nature Can Replace

I have been a big fan of the Patagonia outdoor clothing and gear company for many years. They design and market innovative, high quality products for people who love adventure and outdoor activities. They are committed to the idea that we are all responsible for the health and future well being of our planet. They strive to "make the best products and do the least harm" while doing it. In 1992 they were featured, along with eleven others, in the book "Companies With a Conscience." They give 1% of their sales each year to support environmental organizations around the world.

Over the years Patagonia has changed its manufacturing efforts to avoid using hazardous chemicals and harmful dyes. They elected to use less packaging material. They switched to using all organic cotton in their cotton products to reduce the quantities of water and chemical fertilizers required in the growing process. They began recycling their fleece products for customers and now heavily use recycled fibers in their fleece and outerwear. They use solar energy and ecologically friendly practices at their facilities. And they continue to support initiatives to eliminate obsolete dams to restore fish migrations, focus on the importance of healthy oceans and rivers, the protection of our environment, the wildlife we enjoy and the quality of our lives . . . so we will enjoy the natural world.

Their latest initiative, which is part of their "Common Threads" effort, tells us this story in a new video:

"We (the people of the earth) now use the resources of 1 1/2 planets, but we only have one planet to call home. We are exhausting the earth and the time has come to live within our means. It is now time to reimagine a world where we take nothing from the earth that it cannot replace. This is something we can do, this something we are all called to do, and if we are quiet, we will surely hear it. (We need) to do more with less, make fewer things, pursue not what we vaguely want, but what we deeply need. This, we have the power to do together, to act on behalf of the natural world that sustains us. Living, just by itself, is not fine. To be a citizen of the earth is to put one's brief life to one's clearest gift. To summon the better angels of our nature to own up to all the harm we do, then to put an end to it. Our way of doing business (in the world) has outgrown our planet and it (the planet) now merely runs on reserve. A new (type of) economy must rise in its place that better meets our fundamental purpose, provides balance, and gives nature a chance to rest and time to heal."

The story urges us to:

Reduce what we use and consume
Repair what we have and use
Reuse those things that can still be used by letting others use them
Recycle those things that are no longer usable
and
Reimagine a world where we use only those things from the earth
that it can replace.

These ideas are a challenge to our way of thinking . . . and living. But they are worth making an effort to begin doing. During the rest of 2012 we plan to offer ways we all can do these things. We plan to make it fun and interesting.
