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## Alleluia Set Free

This year our Growing into Worship kids (with the wonderfully skilled help of Mary Matrosic) put together a beautiful “Alleluia” made up of eight little banners; each little banner contained one letter of the word and the kids strung the banners together with beautiful golden cord and brought it to the congregation during the service on the first Sunday of Lent. They then tucked their Alleluia into a black box to remind us that in Lent, we were to focus on other sorts of prayers like “Help me, God” and “I’m sorry God.” They put the box on the shelf inside of the altar and it stayed there for forty days and forty nights. And together we walked the alleluia-less wilderness through the season of Lent.

Then on Easter morning, the kids came forward, found the black box, pulled it out, and set the Alleluia free! They then processed back and draped the Alleluia on the font for our Easter baptisms. Shouts of “Christ is risen!” filled the air and the “Praise God!” of Grace was alive and well again.

We’re encouraged this season to follow the children’s lead, to set our “Alleluias” free, to shout our praise and thanks for all that God has done for us and to let go of the ways that we keep ourselves from knowing true joy or having resurrection touch our hearts. The challenge of the season is this: we are invited to turn from the empty tomb and proclaim that life, new resurrection life has come among us.

As is often the case, the kids get it. They are good with visuals like black boxes and banners and it can often be a little harder for grown-ups to enter the celebration. And maybe that’s because we know that life itself can occasionally feel like that box, like darkness has surrounded us. But the promise, the beautiful joy-filled promise of the season is that there is more, there is always more to come. God is busy going about the work of setting us free.

The lid of life’s box has been lifted, so let yourself give praise. This Easter, turn from the grave and live.

## The Diocese of Western Michigan - update on Mission Trips for 2011.

July 1 – 9 to Pine Ridge, South Dakota, Oglala Lakota Nation. Cost - \$375.00. Four openings remaining. Housing restoration and improving living standards on the reservation are paramount. Besides your work experience, you will be immersed in the culture of the reservation and interact with the native people.

September 24 – October 1 to Barnes Mt, Kentucky. Cost - \$200.00. Twelve openings remain. In the heart of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Appalachia, volunteers may find themselves building a deck, painting, adding a room to a home or trailer, replacing a floor, clearing land, landscaping, or preparing meals for fellow volunteers. On Tuesday evening, volunteers will share a meal with the local people they work with during the day. Evenings may also be spent learning about Appalachian culture from area residents.

November 11 – 20 New Orleans, LA. Cost - \$10.00 per day. Ten openings remain. The Episcopal Diocese of Louisiana continues to help families return to New Orleans six years after Katrina. The Diocese now concentrates on home repairs. Recently, a displaced family still living in Little Rock, Arkansas was returned home after volunteers from our Diocese restored their property. A similar project is planned for this year.

They feel really blessed because the children and families all live here in Holland. Everything from concerts to soccer games keep Chuck and Chris busy. Becca and Chris just returned from a trip to Ireland and England, which had them hiking all over the beautiful hills of the Emerald Isle and taking bus tours around the metropolis of London exploring the many historical spots around that city.

Though Chuck attends another area church Chris has made Grace her church home and is serving presently on the Pastoral Care Commission and St. Martha’s Guild, and has served on Vestry as well. One of her passions has always been writing and she recently worked for a time as a columnist at the small paper, the Holland Observer. Chuck’s an old car enthusiast and has rebuilt both a Model T and Model A Ford Woodies. Between writing and grandchildren Chuck and Chris continue to keep busy and involved.

## **On Tending the Garden**

From the Taking Grace Green Committee of the Stewardship Commission

The earliest creation story in Genesis 2 has God placing the "earth creature" in the Garden "to till it and keep it" (Genesis 2:15). And for thousands of years since humans first began to cultivate plants, gardening has been a primary human activity. Our own ancestors who came to this land were farmers, and the Woodland Indians who lived here before us were also farmers. Unfortunately, in recent years, most people have lost touch with the soil, to the extent that many children believe that lettuce, and carrots, and beans grow on the metal shelves of grocery aisles. Few of us any longer know the pleasure of digging our hands into the earth and pulling out new potatoes. Few of us know the sweet agony of being on our knees for hours pulling out weeds between rows of vegetables. Like the "earth creature" we have allowed ourselves to be cast out of the garden because of our hubris and greed to exploit and dominate creation. We have lost touch with the creation from which we were formed.

But Springtime in which all of creation again puts on a wanton display of fecund and proliferous growth invites us to come back again into the garden; to engage in the pleasure of tilling, planting, nurturing and harvesting the earth. So why not make an Easter resolution to become a gardener again. And wouldn't it be wonderful if the vacant land that used to be a playground for children could be transformed into a community playground (garden) for those of us who have no land and our neighbors, whom we feed on Thursdays, to have a space to garden again.

Also, David and Clara's fifth annual garden party will be held on Friday, June 3 from 5:00 p.m. on. This is a potluck affair so bring along some food and beverages to share with others.

## SPIRITUAL JOURNEYS II

Hello, my name is Kevin and I'm a gratefully recovering Alcoholic.

I was raised in Florida by two very loving parents, both of whom came from fairly strong religious backgrounds, but agreed not to push religion or their religious beliefs strongly onto me. In reflection, I now understand why.

My extended family was more pursuant of religion and spirituality which did give me a good strong base for life and spiritual morality, which I always did enjoy.

When I was 15 years old I lost my mother to cancer and immediately blamed God. I did not understand why this had happened to me, pushed God away and rebelled. Drugs and alcohol were the easiest ways for me to mask all of my feelings and emotions, which I did for many years.

About five years ago everything that I had been doing came crashing down and the reality that I was an addict could not be denied any longer. After years of on and off sobriety I had finally come to the conclusion that I needed to forgive myself and more importantly God, and ask the Lord for help.

Through divine intervention I found myself in a rehabilitation facility and also in touch with my loving family, who, I had finally realized, had always been there for me. My Aunt Clara and Uncle David accepted me with open arms and began working with me on my spiritual journey.

After moving to Holland I was still fighting with myself, my urges, and my cravings. I and a very large support network were consistently praying for my healing. God responded to all of the prayers by blessing me with a vision where I was asked to bury the bottle once and for all. This personal visit from the Lord was not only a life-changing event, but also proved to me that there is a loving God.

I now know, looking back, that God has always been there for me, helping me through the turmoils and hard times in life's journey. I have only recently figured out that it is up to me to be open to receive the guidance and love that the Lord has for me. I do also feel that God uses his faithful people here on earth to help his message be known.

Presently I spend time with myself and God every morning by reading, meditation, and prayer. I also attend church, go to AA meetings, and help others whenever possible. I find that without these things, life for me doesn't feel complete.

Life still for me is by no means perfect, but traveling with my new-found companion makes it much easier to travel in expectation.

I am now realizing that in struggle there is growth and also what it means to have faith and to be a Christian.
