

Children's and Youth Ministries Programs

Programming for children and youth has kicked off and kicked into high gear. It was great to see everyone this weekend. It should be an amazing year!

We welcome back to our program leadership team Kristie Phillips, who will work with our Elementary Sunday School program and Matt and Cherie Schmidt who will again lead the Youth Groups this year. We welcome Radha Deitenbeck to the Elementary team and Elizabeth Brubaker and Sarah Swart to our team in the Middle School Sunday School class. David and Lynn Stubbs and Mary Matrosic round out the team in the Crossways class.

Our High School Education Hour class will focus on Biblical Literacy and will use the Crossways curriculum which encourages participants to come to know the "Big Story" of the Bible. This class is also open to adults in the parish who would like to engage in a long-term Sunday morning Bible study.

Education Hour (Sunday School) for all ages will be from 9:15-10:15. Don't forget that Nursery service is available on the Main Level from 9:00am -12:00pm during the program year for all children ages infant through 3 years old.

The Elementary Class (for those 4 years old – 5th Grade) will be following the "One Room Sunday School" which utilizes a variety of activities and lesson styles to explore the stories of the Bible.

Our Middle School group will utilize the Episcopal Curriculum for Youth and the Nooma video series as well as thematic Bible study.

Youth groups will meet at 12:00 in the Undercroft on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of each month. Any youth interested in participating in the Youth Choir and music opportunities are strongly encouraged to join those rehearsals and jump into Youth Group at 12:15 for lunch. The youth will participate in several service opportunities including organizing registration of teams for CROP Walk, and what has become our annual Grace Youth Move-A-Thon to benefit DeVos Children's Hospital in conjunction with the Hope College Dance-A-Thon. Youth Group fellowship Events this year will include our annual Epiphany retreat (this year with a youth-lead Eucharist), ski trip, and a really exciting end of the year day-trip to Chicago!

In the summer of 2012, the High School Youth will travel once again to England to visit Historic sites, learn more about their faith, and learn more about themselves as they walk a portion of the Canterbury trail. The Diocese of Western Michigan - update on Mission Trips for 2011.

The Diocese of Western Michigan still has openings available for the following mission opportunity for 2011. For this mission, our diocese will pay for all gas directly to and from the destination and the cost of meals while at a mission.

The **New Orleans mission** is scheduled for **November 11th through November 20th**. There is still much work to be done in the aftermath of Katrina. The Diocese of Louisiana now concentrates on returning displaced families to their homes and replanting trees, shrubs, and gardens lost during the hurricanes. The cost per volunteer is \$200, which covers housing, work supplies, and meals.

You do not need particular skills, although skilled volunteers are valuable for mission work. Home repair and landscaping are the principal activity on missions. Volunteers work with crew leaders. What you do need is the willingness to spend a week in service to people in need.

2. Engage as a congregation in responsible stewardship

Stewardship Commission

The Stewardship Commission continued efforts to work on the goals for years 2 through 4. Beginning with the creation of the Endowment Subcommittee, as authorized by Vestry and in alignment with the Strategic Plan, the Stewardship Commission spent hundreds of hours studying and planning how to best invest the significant gifts Grace was blessed with in the past few years. This significant effort continues the Year 1 goal related to the Endowment fund.

Other Year 2 – 4 Goal activities include:

- Beginning the education of Vestry on the structure and operation of the Endowment
 - This will expand to the Parish as a whole as the Endowment plans are finalized
- Used the Time and Talent Survey results and passed information on to specific commissions and programs where those talents fit
 - This effort continues and if you have any updates to your Time and Talent responses please contact the Church Office
 - Look for an exciting off-shoot of the Time and Talent program later this fall!
- Expansion of the Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) program for pledges
 - The continued success of the EFT program benefits Grace. The results during the summer were outstanding and greatly eased our traditional “cash crunch” normally seen during the June through August months.
 - With the coming Pledge Drive we hope to continue this expansion of the program!

Other Year 1 and Years 2 – 4 Goals still underway include

- Conduct a formal Church Space Study
 - The Church has been conducting an extensive Space Study as evidenced by the recently begun Undercroft Renewal.
 - Additional projects are being considered for targeted research to see how Grace can be better served by our facilities and grounds.
- Implement Green Audit Recommendations
 - The Taking Grace Green Committee continues to work on options to reduce our carbon footprint. These will begin to transform into recommendations during the coming months.
- Develop Financial Education Program
 - This program will seek to educate our Parish on financial planning and giving options.
- Establish Develop a Program for and Establish a Capital Reserve Fund
 - A critical component to Grace, Vestry continues to work on the budget and expand the funding for building and facility operations. As this continues Vestry continues to work towards these goals.

Sept 18 -25 Caring for a Creation that Cares for Us

Dr Tom Boogaart, Professor of Old Testament at Western Theological Seminary will speak on how the Bible presents a picture of humans and creation as caring for one another. This picture of mutual care is often overlooked or underplayed in Christian conversations about creation. Western Christians are inclined to see care as something they do for creation, to see themselves as managers, the ones in control. They are less inclined to see themselves as receiving something from creation, that is, being dependent on it.

October 2 Peak Oil with Kurt Cobb

Mr Kurt Cobb is a freelance writer and author of the peak oil-themed novel Prelude. He speaks and writes frequently on energy and the environment, and his work has been featured on *The Energy Bulletin*, *The Oil Drum*, *321energy*, *Le Monde Diplomatique*, *Common Dreams*, *EV World*, and many other sites. Kurt is a founding member of the Association for the Study of Peak Oil and Gas-USA, and he serves on the board of the Arthur Morgan Institute for Community Solutions. He lives in Kalamazoo and is the son of Grace members, Bryce and Monty Cobb.

October 9 Wind Farm Energy: Concept, Technology and Implementation

Grace parishioner Guy Packard, Manager of Consumer Power’s Karn/Weadock Generating Complex, near Bay City, will talk about Consumer’s renewable energy efforts. A significant amount of their new renewable energy supply will come from wind-generation installations or “wind farms.”

**October 16 The Outdoor Discovery Center Macatawa Greenway,
led by Mr Travis Williams**

Thanks to the 2009 merger of the Outdoor Discovery Center and Macatawa Greenway Partnership, this organization now protects over 1,200 acres along the Macatawa River and a 130 acre nature preserve in Fillmore Township. The ODC Nature Preserve has six naturally occurring, distinct ecosystems which include: ponds, remnant dunes, wetlands, meadows, remnant prairies, and lowland hardwood forests. This unique and ecologically diverse area offers the community and schools a place to experience nature close-up. Travis Williams, Executive Director of ODCMG will present.

These sessions will be facilitated by Rev. Jen Adams, Bill Mendenhall and Rev. Henry Idema. The format will be presentation and conversations around the selected essays. We have seen changes in the fish populations, the water tables, the expansion and shrinking of the nearby villages, and the use and types of watercraft. And yet some things still stay pretty much the same.

Families come to the lake for shared time and growing up. They bring their dogs who bring joy, giving their love and companionship, as they follow their shorter life cycles. Adults and children swim, boat, fish, go to the outlet across the lake and spend time by the connecting stream fishing, swimming and enjoying the extended sand beaches of Lake Michigan. They swim in the waves, run and hike the waterline, dig in the sand, eat lunches, and again marvel at the wonderful views of the "big water," tall tree covered sand dunes, and sunsets.

We have found that if we slow things down we can see more of what is going on around us and better experience the natural gifts at the lake. In recent years we have moved away from using our water ski boat and are using a comfortable pontoon boat with an emission friendly, smaller outboard. And we are using two twelve foot kayaks for paddling and exploring our lake, other nearby lakes, rivers, National Park ponds and lakes, and, carefully, Lake Michigan.

One Summer afternoon, early in the first decade of the new century our daughter Heather and I took two kayaks across our lake, paddled through the stream connecting our lake and the "big lake," pushed over the dam, and went out and into Lake Michigan. The water was mirror calm. We smiled and knew this would be special.

We turned South and paddled toward the Waterville Beach area, about a half mile ahead of us. We moved quietly across the clear water, about three hundred feet out, looking at the sand bars and blue green color beneath our boats.

Because of the sunny day and calm, clear water, we decided to push on toward the great dunes further South. We paddled for a while and I began to notice the water darken ahead with schools of fish coming in from deeper waters of the "big lake." Soon there were two large dark masses ahead of us. I pointed them out to Heather. We paddled on and watched them approach our boats then move under us.

They were Alewives, in the tens of thousands. They swam close to the surface and bumped against our kayaks making a thumping sound. Heather excitedly asked if they were going to swamp our boats. I answered no, and told her to relax and enjoy this special moment when the natural world presents itself in a spectacular way.

We sat and watched the fish move and felt them bump our boats for what seemed to be a long time. Then the two schools moved away and were gone.

We talked and marveled at the size of the two schools and the special experience we just had . . . seeing this phenomenon on the water on a clear day from our small boats.

Then, smiling, we turned North paddling back to tell our family our story.


